

Our Home's Upgrade Begins!

We Little Sisters of the Poor in Mobile are upgrading our Home to meet the needs of our elderly for generations to come. We will remodel one wing of our Home to accommodate seventeen apartments for elderly persons able to benefit of independent living space. Following our longstanding tradition of caring for the neediest elderly, we will offer these apartments to older women and men with limited assets.

We will need to raise approximately \$3,000,000 to accomplish this project. Why are we making these changes now? There is a strong demand for housing for independent older adults with limited financial means. In addition, for years we have been challenged by a shortage of nursing staff at Sacred Heart. This nursing shortage is a national problem and affects our ability to continue providing our more frail Residents with the standard of care they deserve.

We will maintain two nursing units and replace the third with these independent living apartments. Once we've completed the renovation of our building, we will be able to better serve those who don't yet require nursing care. Then, as their health changes, these Residents will be able to transition to full nursing care in one of our two nursing units.

We remain committed to serving our Residents and believe that the new apartment wing will maximize quality of life for the elderly who reside in our





Home. The Residents of these new apartments will be a part of the Little Sisters' family, integrated fully into the life of the Home. They will benefit of the same love, respect, and security that characterizes the spirit of the Little Sisters' mission.

In addition to the seventeen apartments, this wing will include a dining area and a coffee shop/ice cream



parlor, which will be open to Residents of our Home and their families.

We have prayed over the decision to add these apartments and we believe they are a real need at this time. With your help, we will continue to carry on the tradition of care that began with our foundress, Saint Jeanne Jugan, in 1839. Please feel free to contact us if you have any questions.

Carrie Allen has been a fixture here at Sacred Heart Residence longer than anyone. She was a nurse at another nursing home for nine months before she came to Little Sisters of the Poor. That was more than forty-four years ago!

Her sister-in-law was here before Carrie. She was the one who encouraged Carrie to come. Once she started working here, she was committed!

"This place felt like a real home to me. That's what made me want to stay."

Carrie has been on the 3-11 shift almost from the beginning. She loves the flexibility that allowed her to raise two kids and take care of her mother, who passed away three years ago.

She fondly remembers her first Mother Superior. "Mother Agatha was so sweet to us. She was always helping the employees here and treated us like family."

"Sr. Celestine was my first supervisor. I got to know so many Sisters and Mothers during my time here," she says. She remembers when there were two Residents in



each room.

Carrie says that she has especially enjoyed getting to know the Residents. "More than one Resident thought that they owned the Home. They didn't hesitate to let you know that," she laughed.

One of her favorites was a Resident named Margaret Blow. "She could make the most delicious lemon meringue pie you've ever eaten!"

Another favorite was Hattie Saucier. Carrie remembers that Hattie loved dressing up. "She wouldn't leave her room without wearing her red lipstick!"

She recalls at least one couple who met here and eventually got married. Carrie also remembers many of the

priests who lived at the Home. "They all had their own personalities."

Carrie says that in the past, Residents did many tasks such as laundry, working at the front desk, and greeting visitors at the front door.

She says, "I've loved getting to know the Little Sisters, the Residents, and my co-workers. We are all one big family!"

Dream Come True

Pat Forrest has been trying to get into Sacred Heart Residence since 2014. Finally, she's home!

"My best friend, Mary Trigg, has been praying for me to get here. Prayers work!"

Pat attended high school at the Convent of Mercy in Mobile. She said she had so much fun at the all-girls school. She spent two years in college at South Alabama before deciding to attend Loyola University in Chicago. That's where one of Pat's many life adventures began.

Pat spent six months studying in Rome, Italy, as part of Loyola's international studies program. She loved visiting the many small

churches in the area, not just the most famous ones.

Her memories include the marble steps, called the "steps of Jesus." Another little church displayed St. Peter's chains. But, she remembers most vividly the side trip she took



with Mary and two new friends to Prague, Czechoslovakia. This was a year after the Russian invasion. Her dad was very concerned about the trip and had asked advice from Congressman Jack Edward's office about traveling there.

When her dad received the "don't go" advice, Pat and her friends had already concluded the visit.

"We stood out among the locals. The Czech government constantly followed us. One "civilian" followed them until he felt safe enough to make contact. He was very pro-United States and showed them a U. S. map. He wanted to hear as much as possible about life in America.

They decided to leave the country by train. "Four different communists told

us that the authorities would arrest us if we boarded the wrong train." No pressure!

In retrospect, Pat says they were stupid college kids, but she doesn't regret the trip.
